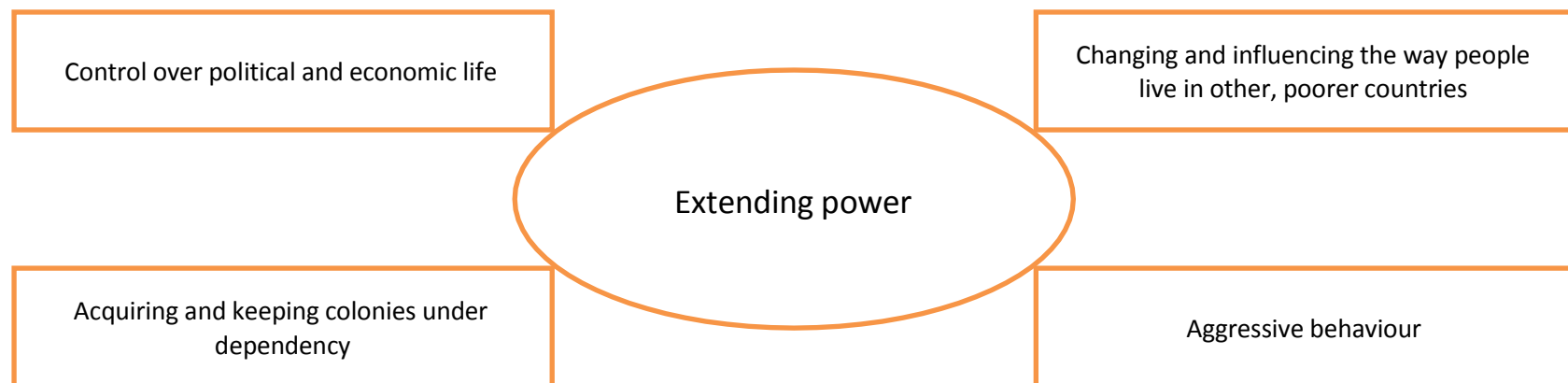
- Students can extract relevant information from a text.

1. Spain, Portugal
